  - What the issue is.
  - Who is involved in the issue.
  - Why this issue is important.
- □ Provide evidence for your claim that includes:
  - An explanation of how a constitutional principle or democratic ideal logically supports your claim on the issue.
  - How one additional piece of credible evidence logically supports your claim on the issue.
- Cite specific textual evidence from at least three different sources that provide relevant information.
